She studied in Antwerp, at the Royal Academy and the Higher Institute of Fine Arts. She teaches at the Academy for visual Art in Halle, Brabant.

Her first works immediately were a statement: simple white bowl

shapes on which she applied

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colourful, repetitive details with similar fragments, all in paper-thin porcelain. With thoughtful shades, Mieke has continued to use the same process throughout her career, however with a subtle, slow evolution. The shape and size of the mosaic-like colour fragments change, sometimes two to three zones with different decorations are placed under-

The frail material and execution as thin as gossamer underline her intense and delicate personality. Occasionally, Mieke adopts a completely different approach, to take time away from her traditional activities or to take a short break, in order to continue with renewed inspiration afterwards. She senses porcelain matter like no other and makes use of this talent with conviction and serenity.

Mieke Everaet is highly rated and very renowned on the international ceramics scene, given the many prizes and awards she achieved; she already won her first prize in 1986. She is always invited to numerous exhibitions around the world, even in the Far East.

BOWL VARIATIONS

in pigmented kaolin clay

Kaolin clay Angular | Wavy Angular | Corrugated In the ceramic works 'Kaolin clay – Angled and Wavy ', Mieke Everaet shows a series of bowl variations made up of pigmented kaolin clay in white, gray and black color areas. The starting point is the bowl in all its facets. The bowls seem to be simple and complex at the same time.

Wavy, convex, concave and angular shapes and lines alternate and play a dynamic game. The bottom of the bowl-shape is often sloping, as a result of which one can look under it, giving the form a sense of lightness.

The interior space has a strong presence and is related to the outdoor space. It is the essence of the work, 'in' and 'out' fade seamlessly into one another. By blending the different shapes together, the perception of the space challenges continuously. Shape, color and structure are fused into one single unit, the bowl-shape. The approach is clear and without any detours.
