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I've been sculpting animals in clay for as long as I remember, without ever thinking about why. It was simply at the center of my interest. But my professional development initially took completely different paths: After training in tailoring, I studied geography and then worked as a landscape planner for six years. The lack of opportunities for expression in my job and also the longing to be able to make a living from working with my hands led me to radically change my professional life when I had the chance.

As an autodidact, I founded my workshop in my own barn 2003, primarily making stoneware tableware. Animal sculptures were initially created incidentally. The positive reaction of customers and collegues to my sculptures encouraged me to focus my strength and energy on sculpturing and now for the second time to leave safe territory to dedicate myself to a cause that moves me deep down. Since then everything has been easy; I now feel like I am completely authentic in my work. Since I like to travel, my exhibitions often take place in other European countries. One focus is on France, where I am close to my sources of inspiration, the fantastic cave paintings of the Grotte Chauvet, the Lascaux cave and many other impressive works by prehistorian artists.
