## Commentary by Kazuko Todate

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The example which combined the material besides the ceramics with ceramics is found in the old days. For example, the earthen vessel which japanned the surface exists in the Neolithic era in Japan. After the second half in the 20th century in particular, the expression which combined ceramics with the material of the metal and the glass could be seen. Glass is the material like the relative of ceramics in the various material Sor drafts. The glaze which puts a protective coating on the surface of ceramic vessels includes glassiness. The glaze by which a ceramic artist puts a protective coating on the surface of the vessel includes ingredient of glass. Glass is used for this work, Sea very effectively. Line of glass like the rain which is power on the curved surface of the waving ceramics remind the viewers the beautful landscape of the sea. At the same time, its landscape makes them consider the natural circulation of the rain, the sea, atmosphere, the earth and the sky. The landscape of the rain and the water seems to continue eternally and on the other hand also makes viewers feel transiency and fragility. Delicacy of the glass is used there effectively. The artist would like to treasure the beautful nature. If man behaves himself insolently, natural beauty may be polluted and destroyed immediately. The artist utilizes the materials of ceramics and glass to the full, and shows nature-views of this artist fantastically.

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Q. Kazuko Todate
Your work reminds me of the circulation of nature. The thin glass looks like rain, and the part of the ceramic reminds me of the wave of the sea. The rain and sea scenery seems to last forever but, on the other hand, it makes me feel fragile. Does this work reflect your view of nature?

My intention is to make the viewers think, dream, make up their own stories. The question is a beautiful answer to my wish. Yes, this work reflects my view of nature. The fragility of nature, the fragility of life.

Q. Kazuko Todate I think that glass is effectively used for this work. Please tell me the reason why you used not only ceramics but also glass.

Using side by side the two beautiful materials, glass and clay has been a challenge. Making them work together seems impossible and that is the fun part for me - it is possible. There must be a bit of miradle in a work. And even though It may know and explain how and why things happen, it is unpredictable anyway. I give the materials opportunity- they play their way.
