My work incorporates various hand building and wheel thrown techniques. I work mainly with stoneware clay and porcelain. Everything is handmade, with attention to detail and no slip casting or mould work as it is important to me that every piece is unique.

My aim is to produce aesthetically pleasing works that are well balanced between form and function, colour, and texture. Function to me is not just in its use but in how the work fills the space it occupies. A simple approach that sometimes lean on the Japanese philosophy of "wabi-sabi". The aesthetic is sometimes described as one of beauty that is "imperfect, impermanent, and incomplete".
